President's Message: Ignacio De La Torre

We extend a special thanks to Shirley Kavanaugh, our June presenter. She is a long-time club member who has a knack for developing Saikei, or "planted landscapes". (She also has knack for winning awards at the County Fair.) It's not easy to present to your fellow members. We appreciate her willing to do so. I shared a few months ago that the Board of Directors wants to focus on increasing the number of female presenters and instructors. When asked, Shirley stepped right up. We have more female presenters (Cheryl Manning) and class instructors ('Lyn Stevenson and Brenda Crann) through the end of the year.

We also extend a big thanks to Louie Monticello who hosted a large juniper workshop. He helped class participants and didn't stop until we emptied the room. And we must thank John Voss who can be found at the back corner of the room at every meeting. He spent the entire meeting helping folks who needed help with their trees.

I close by writing about why it is that we meet on Father's Day. I had a couple of questions about it and explained the reason during our last meeting. It warrants an explanation in this newsletter.

Our club and 38 others are members of the San Diego Botanical Garden Foundation (SDBGF). While most of the other organizations have a plant focus, such as the Iris Society, Cactus and Succulent Society, and Master Gardeners, groups such as the Tropical Fish Society, Herpetological Society (reptiles), and the Beekeeper's Society are also members. The SDBGF is the organization sanctioned by the city of San Diego to oversee the operation of clubs at Balboa Park. This includes coordinating the use of meeting rooms and patio areas and providing insurance coverage. Clubs are required to submit to the SDBGF annual meeting room requests two years in advance. Education: Bill Graham, VP

The heat is continuing to rise! You really need to keep an eye on your watering and ensure that your trees do not dry out. I have had multiple days in the mid 90's and higher. When it gets like this, you may have to water twice a day. Check your soil to see whether is needs watering or not. There has also been a lot of wind lately. This will dry your trees out just as bad as the excess heat.

Louie Montecillo led a class using very nice large Juniper prostrata's. The trees were large with great character. Louie did an excellent job leading and helping to style the trees. This was Louie's first time leading a class and it was a great success!

Beginning Class: - Olea euroapea - Olives - 'lyn Stevenson. April 10 - June 19 - July 10

This is the third and final session in this series and you will finish up your styling, wiring, and pruning your tree. You will repot your trees. The class starts at 8:30 am in Room 104. Please be on time or a few minutes early if you can help get the room set up for the class. Observers are always welcome. Even if you do not get into the class, you can still observe and learn. Beginning Class: - Myrtus communis - Common Myrtle - Brenda Crann. August 7 - September 11 - December -11

The third and final beginning class for 2022 will start in August. We have some nice Myrtus communis – the common myrtle. These trees are great material for bonsai. They back bud profusely, have nice small leaves, cream-colored flowers and exfoliating bark. What more could you as for? Brenda Crann will be the teacher for this session. The sign-up sheet will be at the June meeting. The cost is \$50.00. AS ANNOUNCED AT THE JUNE MEETING, THE 3RD SESSION OF THIS CLASS WILL BE AT THE DECEMBER MEETING!! SOLD OUT!

Intermediate Workshops:

July – Large Olives – John Voss. John has been working on these olives for several years. They are large and will be either clump or broom style. If you were at the December Meeting, I had an example on display at the back of the room. These are nice, large trees and will make great bonsai! SOLD OUT!

August - NO WORKSHOP – CLUB REPOTTING EVENT. We are going to try something new. There are trees that need to be repotted in the summer and the heat. We are going to have a warm season repotting event. These trees are olives, bougainvillea, ficus and other tropical you may have. Bring a tree and our many volunteers will help you repot it. Please limit yourself to two (2) trees. **PLEASE** clean your trees before bringing them in. Soil and assistance will be provided both before and after the meeting.

September – Chaenomeles japonica – Dwarf Red Chojuba - Glenn Jensen. We have a special and rare opportunity! Glenn Jensen will be leading a workshop with Chaenomeles japonica - Dwarf Red Chojubai, a small leaved red flowering Japanese quince. These trees make beautiful small bonsai with very pretty flowers. They can flower multiple times during the year and make elegant bonsai. Glenn has experience with these, and this should be an excellent class. This class is limited to 6 attendees. **The sign-up sheet will be at the July meeting.** The cost is \$115.00

October - NO WORKSHOP - ANNUAL PICNIC AND SALE AT LAKE POWAY.

Robert 'Bob' Pressler is the owner of Kimura Bonsai Nursery in Northridge, CA. He serves as the president of the California Bonsai Society and is a member of John Naka's club, Nanpuki, and Dai Ichi Bonsai Kai. He's been involved with bonsai for 53 years, starting at age 10!

Like most good teachers, he has studied with a variety of teachers himself starting informally with Frank Okamura at the Brooklyn Botanical gardens in the early 70's when he was a young boy. He moved to CA in 1984 and, a couple of years thereafter, met John Naka, Ben Oki and the whole crowd of Southern CA Bonsai artists. He also participated with numerous clubs which helped him expand his skills and gave him the opportunity to share his skills with others. In 2000, he met Kenji Miyata at a convention in CA and, since 2001, has been studying with him. Bob has conducted classes at his nursery as well as demo's and workshop for clubs near and far, visiting all parts of CA and many other states. Bob is also a landscape designer to the stars (including an Oscar winner).

Bob has received numerous awards, including the Nagata-Komai Award for Excellence in Instruction and Encouragement in the Art of Bonsai. This is a testament to his teaching style. The San Diego Club is fortunate to have him join us.

Japanese Friendship Garden: by Neil Auwarter, Curator

Early summer is a relatively slow time in the garden. Spring foliage is hardened off and ready for the heat. The black pines will get some selective candling to balance strength. An olive and a bougainvillea will be repotted this month or next. And Charlie's woodcarving project continues on the old stump of a ginkgo that over time has morphed into a clump of younger trunks.

The accompanying photos are from my own garden. Photo 1: A Mourning Cloak butterfly, *Nymphalis antiopa*, rests on the tip of a cascade Silverberry. Mourning cloaks are not significant pollinators; instead, they eat mainly sap and decaying fruit. And with a lifespan of up to a year they are one of the longest-lived butterfly species. Photo 2: Another species, *Canis familiaris*, subspecies undetermined, rests on an upright Silverberry.

Enjoy the summer heat but prevent spider mites from doing the same by applying brisk watering to your conifers' foliage!



A donated tree with a unique history

The club occasionally receives donations of trees, pots, and other bonsai-related items. It isn't often that someone donates a full-size tree with a unique history. That was the case when Russ Okihara, a retired dentist from San Diego, offered the club a full-size Japanese black pine. Russ was redoing his backyard and wanted to ensure the pine went to a good home.

Dennis Wagner, the club's Assistant Curator at the Safari Park Pavilion, and I visited Russ and what we found was a beautiful and very nicely developed Japanese black pine with a wonderful history. Russ shared that he purchased the tree in 1997 from Mas Takanashi who had grown it at his home. Masao "Mas" Takanashi was a founding member and early president of our club. He was a giant in the early development of bonsai culture in California. Mas planted the tree at Russ' home because he wanted to ensure it had a good chance to thrive. That it did.

Russ mentioned since then he and his uncle have taken care of the tree. His uncle is Jim Kimura, a former club member (and retired dentist) who now lives in Washington. It seemed the coincidences just kept coming.

We then started with the transplant. It took us about three hours to remove the tree and load it into Dennis' truck (Russ had to help us carry out the tree to the truck.) It takes great care to save as much of the root ball when transplanting a tree, especially one that did not have extensive root growth. The root ball was wrapped in cloth shade and wrapped with twine.

The tree was planted the next day at the pavilion in the Safari Park by Dennis Wagner, John Jackson, and Mark Edgar. A prominent location was quickly selected, and it was planted. The tree was then decandled and needles were pulled to minimize the amount of water it will require. It will take great attention to ensure it does well. The team at the Pavilion is closely monitoring it.

The tree now welcomes guests at the entrance to the pavilion. We thank Russ for the great donation and the history lesson.

Program Notes from our June Presentation: By Keith Carter

Presenter Shirley Kavanaugh

One of the basic aims of bonsai cultivation is to present trees as close as possible to the way they appear in nature.

So, what better way to exhibit a tree in a truly natural context than with a seikei, or "planted landscape?"

That's just what longtime SDBC member Shirley Kavanaugh showed members how to do at the June meeting as she assembled a beautiful seikei tray planting using distinctive schist stones, five ficus burtt-davyi trees from her personal collection and accent plants.

Shirley is a master of the seikei, having just won "best of show" honors at the 2022 San Diego County Fair for one of her tray plantings.

She uses an artistic approach to the assembly process when deciding where to locate the various elements: "It's like a

puzzle," she said. "I just fiddle with things until they look right." Be careful, however, not to place the roots of the trees under the rim of the tray, because water can collect there and make them soggy.

After positioning the trees and stones, Shirley placed small accent plants strategically around the tray, then scattered decomposed granite over the roots to hold everything in place.

After assembling a tray, she places it in a location where she won't have to move it for 3-4 months to allow the trees and plants to become established.



Shirley, as a "cute and fun" project also put together a tray planting that incorporated plants, rocks, sand, and seashells, which she donated to the club raffle table.
