

As we wrap up another year, there are numerous members who worked diligently and continue to give so much to our Club. Thanks to all of you - club officers, who devote much time and energy; volunteers who kept our activities fun and interesting; and those who work behind the scenes at club meetings and shows to make

things run smoothly. Thanks to all who made 2016 another successful year in bringing bonsai to San Diego.

There are two exciting opportunities coming in the next couple of months. The first is the Baikoen Bonsai Kenkyukai annual Silhouettes show on January 21st. The show is entirely composed of deciduous trees in their winter, leafless form. This year the Taiko Drum Ensemble will be providing the entertainment. This

professional drum group incorporates dynamic movement and rhythmic grooves with heart pounding percussion.... an astounding performance.

The second opportunity is the Bonsai-A-Thon at the Huntington Library and Gardens on February 25th. This year, the Club is subsidizing the bus trip, reducing the price from \$40 to just \$25. We especially want new members to experience this event. Other than the GSBF convention every other year, this is the single biggest bonsai event in Southern California. November Program

Mel Ikeda was our presenter at the November meeting and took us on a complete tour of the process to create a raft planting. A raft planting is different from a forest planting, as it starts out with just one tree. Mel indicated that good trees to start with include Leyland Cypress (used in the demo), procumbens nana junipers (used in the workshop) and foemina junipers. With the right development techniques, a raft can have the overall look and natural feel of a traditional forest planting.

To start, one has to decide on the 1,2, and 3 trees that will be created from branches on the tree; the 1,2, and 3 trees are critical in a forest planting. The number one tree is the largest. After that choice, the tree has its bark scraped on the side of the tree where the roots will grow. Branches on the same side as the scraped area are short-

ened and buried to become roots. The next step is to wire the branches up to form the 1,2, and 3 trees of the raft. Since there are significant



bends to some branches, Mel uses a lot of heavy wire. (continued on page 4)

The tree rootball is then sawn in half, eliminating the entire half on the same side as the scrape and the tree is laid out horizontally in the specially built wood box with the scraped area placed below the soil line. The trunk is tied down and will then create roots. Once the roots along the trunk take hold, the main rootball can be reduced or eliminated completely. To finish up the initial stage, the 1,2, and 3 trees are shortened (2 and 3 trees must be smaller than the number 1 tree) and branches on the 1,2, and 3 tree are wired. Additional branches on the original tree are also wired into place to create an odd number of trees. In the demo, the tree had five total trees created from branches.

Finally, Mel showed what the finished planting may look like in the future by adding moss, rocks, and sand. He indicated it will take a couple of years of growth to establish the roots and improve the foliage.

Bonsai Ideas by Marty Mann

The holiday season is a very busy time for most of us. Our attention is diverted and the wintertime bonsai may be neglected. However, this is a time of year when the admiration of the deciduous silhouettes and the general outline and form of each tree is best noted.

Look at your trees. Check the branch ramification, the crossing branches, the overall triangular form to perfect your designs. Reduce long internodes of growth from prior periods. Study the taper of the trunk and the placement of equally balanced side-back-front branches. Open up the structure of the tree to allow better light penetration. Pinch excess evergreen growth to create tight, colorful new spring growth.

Dormant winter months are excellent training months; light wiring can be applied to small branches after 'defoliating' the straggling leaves of deciduous trees. However, check this wire frequently since the woody portion of a tree continues to lignify during winter months to avoid destructive and unsightly wire cuts. Junipers can be trimmed and re-wired during these dormant months.

Since much of your potting activity will not begin until signs of spring are evident, now is the time to plan ahead. Prepare supplies of potting soil mix, pot screens, aggregates (i.e. volcanic rock, pumice, etc.) and some form of humus (i.e. fir bark, redwood bark, peat, etc.). Clean up the collection of unused pots. Be ready for spring time. Review the rootage conditions of potted trees. If the specimen appears to be lifting out of the pot or appears to be root bound in the pot then plan ahead by identifying and marking those ready for early repotting in spring. Tag the trees that will require repotting.

Conifers and evergreen trees continue to grow in the California climate. Partial dormancy requires some nourishment. A light feeding applied to the soil surface is best as foliar feeding encourages green growth that can be severely damaged if a cold spell occurs. Fungus thrives during the dormant months. The application of fungicides is as important now as it is in spring when active reproduction takes place.

California winters are usually interspersed with many warmer days, so potted trees must still be watered. Cooler weather means slower growth. During this period of dormancy, trees require a regular dampening of the root zone. Transpiration of moisture is almost non existent due to the absence of foliage, but watch out for drying winds.

Take this time to read, study and learn about bonsai in general. Your education and skills are refined when you study just as much as when you do it. It is said that a

picture is worth a thousand words. Bonsai magazines and books display wonderful pictures of fine trees in many styles and varieties. Imitate the best examples; compare and refine your own collection.

Happy New Year to you and your bonsai. May next year be your happiest and healthiest.

2017 January Program

The Soil Extravaganza, a corny but good name, will be back in January. It is an excellent opportunity to learn about soils and proper re-potting techniques. We invite any member to bring in a tree or two for help in repotting with assistance by experienced club members. You can even get some styling tips. The club will provide soil, wire and pot screen for the re-pot.

Proper technique significantly helps the tree to recover from the re-pot. At re-potting, the roots are properly pruned and placed to maximize root growth and plant stability in the pot. It is an excellent opportunity to see if the nebari can be enhanced. This is the time to properly position the tree in the pot; it is very necessary for the tree to be planted at the proper angle, at the correct depth and distances from the sides of the pot. Proper positioning helps to the maximize the look of the bonsai.

Available will be different soil mixes and some components to buy. There will be members on hand to answer your questions about the different soil mixes and soil components in the mixes. A good soil mix is extremely important for many reasons: tree recovery from re-potting, preventing root rot from poor drainage, enhancing the growth of smaller roots, proper water and nutrient retention and release. A good soil mix is the foundation for growing a healthy bonsai.
