

Fall Bonsai Show

Our Fall Show is really shaping up. We've almost filled every display table. I'm sure our visitors will be in awe of your talents. I have two tables that I was saving for our novice bonsai artists. At this time they are up for grabs by anyone. Please send *me* an email, janicehale42@ gmail.com, if you are interested in setting up your tree on one of those tables. I'll also have the sign-up sheet at the September meeting.

If you haven't been to one of our shows, here is how it all happens. I'll have sign-up sheets for a myriad of volunteer tasks available for you at the September meeting. Please consider donating a few hours of your time to help us put on this spectacular show. The tasks are all very easy, and someone will be there to help you. No experience necessary. Volunteering at the show is a fantastic way to give back to the Club and to

meet your fellow bonsai enthusiasts.

First we'll set up Room 101 on Thursday, September 21st. We arrange the display and sale area tables, put up the back drops and table coverings, put together the tokonoma display and then enjoy some sodas and pizza. Easy peasy.

Volunteers Needed!

On Friday, September 22nd, the folks who have signed up to display their trees will bring them in and set them up. We need helpers to go out with the garden carts and help these folks bring in their trees, accent pieces and stands. Some of the trees can be quite large.

Friday is also when any SDBC club member can bring in bonsai related items to place in our sale area. We need more people to man the garden carts to go out to the cars and help haul in the goodies. Each sale item must have a completed tag and the club member will have a consignment sheet listing each item. We need volunteers to carefully check off the tags on each item against the consignment sheets and make sure everything is in order. If you didn't pick up your sale tags and consignment sheets at the August meeting, I'll have them available at the September meeting. We also need some folks to walk around after everything is set up and clean up the table coverings, sweep the floor, straighten chairs and make the place ready for when the doors open on Saturday morning. Oh, and there will be sodas and cold pizza available to snack on.

On Saturday, September 23rd, please come in by 9:30am to help neaten up anything we missed on Friday night, and to be ready at your volunteer location when we open the doors at 10:00am. There is usually a line of visitors waiting for the doors to open. We will need volunteers to sit at the greeter's table at the front door welcoming visitors and making sure they don't bring open beverages or food to the showroom. Dogs and children on leashes are fine. We need volunteers to work the sales table as well as security to roam the sales area to make there are no sticky fingers, and answer questions about the plants for sale. We need you to help man the membership table and let visitors know how great it is to be a SDBC member. What we can never have enough of is security in the display area. We need three or four people per row making sure no one touches the displays. Some of the trees may have flowers or fruit and they are oh so tempting to touch. We also have a couple of tables outside the showroom where you can work on your trees, answer questions by passersby, and encourage visitors

to go in to enjoy the show. Please consider bringing in some food to share with your fellow volunteers. It's pretty tough to get out for lunch during the show and snacks are always appreciated. I'll have plenty of bottled water available.

On Sunday...we do it all again! So if you can't make it on Saturday, you

can still volunteer on Sunday. After we close the doors Sunday evening, we will once again need volunteers at the sales tables area. Club members will come in to take home anything that didn't sell. You'll check off the remaining items against the consignment sheet. Our members who have displayed trees may need help taking their trees back out to their cars. And once everything has been cleared out, we'll need lots of help to take down the backdrops and table coverings and roll them up nice and neatly so when the Spring Show comes around, there are no wrinkles. We'll put Room 101 back the way we found it, organized and clean.

So please, find a task on the sign-up lists and volunteer. There are many more tasks than those mentioned above. You'll be helping your Club and I know you'll have a good time. How could you not? You get to spend a few hours getting to know your club members better and you'll have had a hand in putting on one of the best bonsai shows in the country. Thank you all for everything you do!

Beginning Classes:



This is the second session of the Juniper Beginners Class. This session will focus on finishing your styling and the proper way to wire your tree. Keep an eye on your trees and do not let them dry out. Please note the scheduling of this class, there is no class in October or November and the final class will be in December. The instructors are Mark and Cathy Edgar.

The class starts at 8:30 in Room 104 Please be on time or a few minutes early. Observers are always welcome. Even if you did not get in to the class, you can still

observe and learn.

New members are always excited about taking the Beginners Classes, and several have asked to be put on a waiting list for the next class. If you are a new member please note that sign-up sheets for all classes and workshops are first available at the Bonsai Club meeting TWO months before the classes/workshops are held. Bonsai Ideas #129

After Summer's Growth - Autumn ... Winter is coming.

Fall is generally the climax of the luxurious growth of summer and the last spurt of activity before settling down for winter dormancy. Your bonsai will no longer grow very much so the need for extensive pruning should be minimal. Since recent growth may have added girth to branches and trunks it would be p rudent to check all wired branches to see if they are set and, if they are, the wires can be removed.

Fall is an excellent time to gather tree seeds as they ripen. Oak tree acorns, pine tree cones and varieties of maples are in profusion--an excellent source for over wintering in your refrigeration for stratification. They may then be planted in early spring for new nursery seedlings and future training stock.

Light conditions begin to change. Trees which have had full sun exposure find themselves in more shade. So, watch the location of trees at this time of year and rotate them into more favorable light exposures allowing them to continue storing strength and food for the winter.

Deciduous trees begin to show fall colors as soon as cooler nights are more common. After they have had their moment of glory, remove any brown leaves as they appear. Keep the trees free of accumulated trash which house many undesirable wintering insects and encourage fungus buildup. Keep the trees open, light and airy.

Cooler nights and the effect of the Autumn Equinox, with equal days and nights, adds to this phenomena. All winter growth generally goes into the lignification of woody branches and trunks.

Cut back on your watering schedule but don't allow the trees to dry out. As the length of the day's sunshine is shortened the trees require less water. A balance must be maintained between the minimal watering and the loss of moisture by transpiration during intermittent hot spells.

Repotting is permissible at this time of year, specifically bamboo, boxwood, hornbeams, cotoneaster, *Podocarpus*, privets, *Pyracantha*, wisteria, willows and most varieties of deciduous trees. (Ref.: Bonsai Techniques #1, by John Naka, Published in 1973).

The key to safe repotting is







August Meeting

- Call to Order: The regular meeting of the membership of the San Diego Bonsai Club was called to order at 10:30 in Balboa Park, Casa del Prado, room 101, by Bob Hale, President. It was confirmed that we have a quorum present. All board members and volunteers were acknowledged.
- 2. Approval of Minutes: The minutes from the July 9, 2017 meeting were approved as published.
- 3. President's remarks: Charlie Tamm one of our long term members passed away this month. Our Club will need volunteers to support our fall show. This is a great way to get to know your fellow Club members. There are many opportunities including working on your trees and answering questions from the public. The show is a great place to find some great trees and pots.
- 4. Board Member Reports:
 - Nazim Colak: VP for membership, reported: 4 new members were signed up last month.
 - Bob Hale for Charlie Mosse, 1st Vice President, reported: Charlie is recovering from surgery and we should start seeing more of him next month. There is no presentation planned for September. We ask that members bring in trees, accent plants, and stands that they plan to display in the show or a tree that needs some help for a work session right after our general meeting. The schedules for all future programs are listed in the Bonsai Wire.
 - Bill Graham, VP for Education, reported: The first session of the Fall Juniper class with Mark and Cathy Edgar was held today. The September workshop using six trees from Kenji is sold out. The instructors are Michael Sykes, Glenn Jensen, and Fred Miyahara. Bring in your Fred Miyahara Black Pine class trees to the December meeting at 8:30 AM.
 - Janice Hale, Treasurer, reported: The balance for SDBC checking account is \$35,405, of which \$216 is available to the Japanese Friendship Garden. The Safari Park Bonsai Pavilion checking balance is \$11,848.29. We recently paid \$33,768 for capital improvements to the Bonsai Pavilion at the Safari Park. Concrete walkways throughout the pavilion as well as slabs in the volunteer work area were poured. Of the \$33,768, \$20,000 was funded by a grant from the

- County of San Diego, \$5,000 funded by the San Diego Bonsai Club per SDBC board approval (6-2 Vote) in July 2016, and the remaining \$8,768 came from fund raising efforts for the project. This project gives SDBC, as a whole, a year-to-date net loss of <\$10,391>. If anyone is interested Janice has the detailed income statement available.
- 5. Janice Hale, Special Projects, reported: The Fall Show is scheduled for Sept 23 and 24. Set-up is Thursday 9/21; Friday 9/22 bring in trees. Saturday 8/26: Nisei Week bus trip to little Tokyo in Los Angeles at the Japanese American Cultural Center. The bus will make a stop at Roy Nagatoshi's Fuji Bonsai Nursery.
- 6. Appointed Position Reports:
 - John Jackson, SDBC Safari Park Bonsai
 Pavilion Curator, reported: He gave thanks to
 all the Bonsai Pavilion volunteers for all their
 hard work and dedication. The cement path
 way improvement to the Pavilion was recently
 completed. The Bonsai Pavilion is now closed to
 the public due to construction on the Australian
 Outback project. Next Saturday will be the next
 volunteer workday. New volunteers are welcome.

to minimize root disturbance and to exclude severe pruning. Trees can be transferred into larger or different containers. If in doubt about the health or condition of a tree wait another month or until spring to repot.

Late summer feeding, with reduced amounts of nitrogen, may be continued throughout the fall months into November. A suggested basic mix (0-10-10) of low nitrogen 70% cottonseed meal/30% bone meal may be supplemented with foliar feeding for evergreen, conifers and other non-deciduous material. Warm spells are common at this time and trees often respond with new growth. Tender growth is susceptible to damage if any sudden cool weather occurs.

August Program in Review

Bob Hale, SDBC President

John Jackson gave an informative talk and demonstration on ficus trees. He performed some styling, root pruning, and repotted a ficus into a natural clay pot. Here are some of John's tips to keep in mind when working on ficus trees;

- Always repot during summer months. These trees are most active during the summer and will quickly respond to pruning and repotting.
- To propagate cuttings John says the bigger the better. Cuttings should be woody. Avoid small green cuttings.
- Be careful with Ficus benjamina they are touchy and do not care for leaf pruning.



- John recommends wire brushing or running your fingers repeatedly around wounds to stimulate the cambien layer to heal more rapidly.
- Ficus are not particular about the type of fertilizer used.
- Ficus trees tend to shed. So yellow leaves don't really mean anything.
- The large roots of ficus trees do not need to be long. The small roots actually feed the tree. Ficus will tolerate heavy root pruning so don't hold back when pruning roots. Keep in mind that Nebari is the most important aspect of good bonsai. So focus on the root structure to insure development of good Nebari.
- You can zip-tie two trunks together to form a tree with a larger trunk. This technique does not require scraping the trunks. The trees will just grow together.




