Is there a favorite bonsai soil mixture? My take is that the specimen, location, and personal experience will dictate your favorite bonsai soil mixture among scoria, fir bark, pumice, decomposed granite, and akadama, as long as it does not have too much organic material (like commercial Bonsai potting mix does). Small bags of soil mix are available at our Tool Sales sections during our monthly meeting in room 101. If you prefer to purchase a large amount of soil components, check out A-1 Soils information on our website "resources" tab under "vendors." If you head out to A-1 Soils, in addition to the items mentioned on our website, be sure to take water to drink, a long sleeve shirt, and lots of patience.

We have finished another busy month, and thank you to our hard-working volunteers; we want you to come back for more of that excellent pay of "thank you."

Our 50-year committee and our Club Officers are reaching out to our members to help us; no experience is



### SDBC Education

### January at the SDBC

#### **BEGINNING CLASS IN FEBRUARY**

'lyn Stevenson will be teaching the second session this month. Work will be done to determine a front along with shaping your tree through trimming and wiring. Be sure and read the references 'lyn gave in relationship to the book *Basic Bonsai*. If you did not receive this book but one by Marty Mann you may exchange it at the class. There is a lot to do this session so be sure and arrive on time. The class starts at 8:30am in Room 104.



**FEBRUARY WORKSHOP:** Michael Sykes will be leading his very popular workshop on *Juniperus chinensis* 'Foemina' (foemina junipers). Tree and wire is provided but be sure and bring your tools. The class starts at 8:30 in Room 101 to the right of the entrance. This class is filled.

#### SIGN UP FOR FUTURE CLASSES/ WORKSHOPS

Beginning Class, April 12, June 28, July 12. Martha Choy will be the teacher for this beginning class that features the olive tree. These are good, well grown, beginner olives. Cost for the class is \$40 and includes tree, pot, pruners, and book. Maximum number of people is 20.

March 8 Workshop: Fred Miyahara will be teaching in a workshop on *Pinus thunbergii* (Japanese Black Pines). Fred brought in two samples of these outstanding pines to the Club meeting. They have a good trunk diameter. Bring your tools; tree and wire will be provided. Cost: \$110. Max: 10 people

April 12 Workshop: John Jackson will be leading a class on Large Oaks. There will be several types of Oaks available. Tree and wire will be provided. Cost: \$50. Max: 8 People

## January Program

First VP Bob Hale presented "Soil: It's What Goes in the Pot" and led a group discussion of soils. The quality of the soil directly affects the health and vigor of the bonsai. Experience has shown that a tree's poor health can often be traced to being planted in poor soil (often largely organic or just garden soil). What we should look for is 1)good water retention, 2) good drainage, 3)good aeration, and 4) nutrient control. Bob led us through the various organic (barks, peat, etc.) and inorganic materials (scoria, pumice, perlite, akadama, etc.) and their properties. Bob's tests found mixes high in inorganic material were similar in providing water retention, drainage, aeration, and nutrient control but with some differences in each area. Experts' mixes ranged from 70—100 percent inorganic material. For example, the Safari Park mix is 4 parts scoria, 4 parts pumice and 2 parts orchid bark (80 percent inorganic material). The full presentation is available on the SDBC website under the resources tab.

#### **GRAFTING WORKSHOP**

Fred Miyahara led a grafting workshop at the January meeting where he demonstrated each of the three types of grafts—thread, inarch (or approach), and side veneer. Fred placed a special emphasis on the thread and inarch grafts that have to be used with deciduous trees because of their thin bark and cambium layers.

Fred demonstrated thread grafting with a small seiju elm and a large cork oak. A branch is allowed to grow very long and a hole is drilled through the trunk (or branch) large enough to fit the end of the branch through the hole without breaking off the buds. The branch is pulled through until snug and sealed with cut paste pressing downward to make a connection of the branch with the cambium of the trunk and making it water-tight.

The inarch graft is similar to the thread graft except the

connection is made on the side of the trunk (or branch). A V notch was made in the trunk and a small tree in a 4 inch pot was scraped to expose the cambium and placed in the V notch to match the cambium of the trunk, tied very tightly with tape, and sealed. This graft is easier than the side veneer graft, but is very delicate and



generally requires two years to completely take.

Fred also demonstrated the more complicated side veneer graft where a cutting, called a scion, is cut to be able to be inserted into a knife cut on the side of the branch so the cambium layers match. Don't try this one without supervision from Fred!

# SDBC Honoree - Marty Mann

Marty's love of gardening started in Chicago where he lived across the street from a park. He planted tulips. About 1970, 40 years later, he found a place called A Bonsai Yard, his first interaction with bonsai.

Marty found his first teacher in Melba Tucker, his life's blood. He was fascinated with bonsai and learned something from every teacher he worked with including Harry Hirao, Dick Wydman, John Naka, Kay Komai, Khan Komai, Shig Nagatoshi, Ernie Kuo, and Warren Hill. All his reading and learning, lectures, studying and joining clubs taught him a great deal.

All this information needed to be spread, so Marty began writing newsletter articles entitled "Bonsai Ideas" for clubs all over California, which later would become the title of his book compiling all these informative articles into one source. His book is all over the U.S., and used by SDBC in our beginners classes, and articles from his book frequently appear in our own "Bonsai Wire."

Marty has been a member of SDBC since 1996 and said he was drawn to the progressiveness of the club and its teaching potential. He wanted to teach others and continue to learn himself. He has shown trees in the club shows since that first year and every year until recently when a stroke slowed him down.

Marty, when asked what was his greatest satisfaction from bonsai, said, "Seeing a living tree become a work of art." He drew great enjoyment at watching a cutting develop into a small tree, and then a bonsai; he became quite skilled at propagation. His favorite species is the Trident Maple because he missed the changing colors where he grew up. Marty's generosity has spread his trees from the Huntington in L.A. (Trident Maples, a Ginko and Liquidambars) to our own Safari Park pavilion (suiseki, trees, and tenuki (or phoenix) bonsai).

Marty's greatest lesson/disaster was, as he said, "Don't rely on a neighbor, a teenager, to take care of your bonsai when you go on vacation when they really didn't have an interest in bonsai." Something we can all learn from as he lost some valuable trees in that lesson.

Marty's greatest hope for bonsai is to get more young people involved. Older members need the young people and their energy. He is invigorated by the young people learning from the masters in Japan who then return to share their knowledge with people here.

His interest extended to Haiku, a high form of poetry. Marty created poems as he watched clouds passing overhead, a flower dancing in the wind, or a bonsai growing on a table. He has over 300 Haiku poems in his keeping and many grace our newsletter and his book.

In all this, Marty says that his wife Ruth has been his

greatest aide and confidant. He is truly blessed and grateful to have travelled this bonsai journey with her by his side. We shall see them both at future meetings as Marty's love for bonsai has not diminished.
