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## August Program

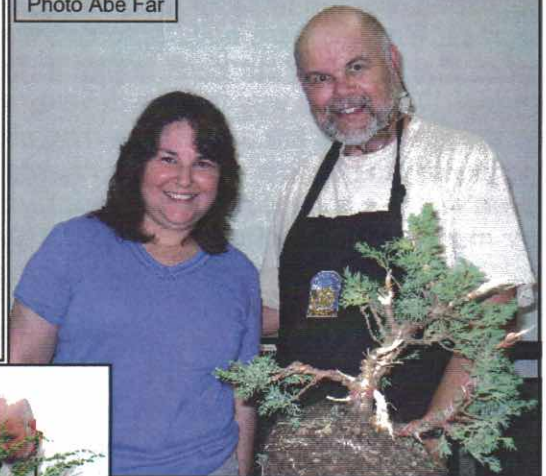

# San Diego Bonsai Bonsai Ideas

## #104 August, 2010

Watering is important during the summer months. Don't overlook the obvious drying extremes in a shallow bonsai pot. Root systems are stressed and continued moisture is a must. Neglect will cause twig dieback, leaf drop and leaf droop. Summer stress weakens a tree and threatens its future health. Water more frequently, with shorter soaking periods. Be sure the soil mix contains some humus to retain the moisture as well as an aggregate (i.e., pumice, sand, d.g. or lava rock) to encourage good drainage. Early morning watering allows foliage to dry during the day. Early watering inhibits and prevents the formation and growth of harmful fungus.

While watering your trees, briskly spray the tree's foliage to remove impurities and discourages harmful insects. Be sure the water penetrates the root ball. Remove excess patches of moss or build-up of thatch that repels water. Check the soil levels around the rim of the pot. Provide a ridge to encourage the water to drain *into* the pot rather than *over* the rim. Keep checking automatic watering systems you may be relying on to be sure they are functioning properly. Have a *bonsai friend* keep an eye on this activity if you are vacationing.

Shohin/Mame specimens do well in shallow trays of sand or fine gravel. This promotes higher humidity conditions and reduces the risks of drying out. Trees in deep containers may only dry out on the surface, an important fine rootage growing area, but may be saturated in the depth of the pot. Test these conditions before any arbitrary water applications. Watch for signs of poor drainage. Keep neighboring hard surfaces such as benches or concrete surfaces wet. The evaporative cooling provides lower surrounding temperatures.

Summer months are so important when caring for the trees. This is a period of extraordinary activity for garden pests. The warm air and frequent watering encourage insects such as whiteflies, aphids, scale, mealy bugs and red spider mites. Apply protective fungicides.

## HB-101 Presentation

Stuart Shim provided an informative presentation on the benefits of HB-101, a natural plant super concentrate, as well as a new type of soil additive product based on recycled glass called Growstones. Stuart had the attention of at least 20 of the SDBC members in the intermediate area. He provided handouts and samples to the audience.

Due to the soil and nutrient balance that is needed for our potted trees, it is important to understand the micro-environment that exists in the pots. A shift in soil moisture retention, or loss of nutrients, can affect or impact your tree's health. Keeping a close eye on your trees, noticing any changes, and doing the research when you notice a

change is a constant struggle for any bonsaist. At some point, you will find a good mix of soil, fertilizer, sunlight, and a consistent watering routine. Patience is needed especially if you choose to adopt caring for many varieties of plant species.

Diazinon (liquid)	3 to 4 years
Isotox	2 to 3 years
Malathion	6 to 8 years
Orthene	4 to 5 years
Sevin (liquid)	5 to 6 years
Captan	5 to 6 years
Daconil*	6 to 7 years

(\*Ortho Garden Disease Control)

During prolonged storage periods these chemicals should be protected from strong light and heat. Keep all chemicals cool and dry.

Approach your summer activity with an eye to enjoyment of the form and color of the trees. Fall will come soon enough if you keep up with summer care.

If only trees could talk -- they do! They exhibit signs that tell you how they feel. Consider these indicators when you are troubled by 'tree problems'.

- *Misshapen leaves*--upward curling of the leaf margins into a cup is a classic symptom of damage from either a sucking insect, a disease organism or a possible overspray of a herbicide. Investigate the cause and apply insecticide or fungicide as required.
- *Color indicators of plant problems*--either a nutrient deficiency in the soil or a problem with the root system that is unable to absorb the plant nutrients. The type of color display is important. A pattern of progressive yellowing of new leaves suggests a nitrogen or iron deficiency. Iron chlorosis will show on new leaves. Nitrogen deficiency affects the older leaves. Investigate the cause and apply fertilizer as required.

Enjoy the colors of growing plants during these summer days.

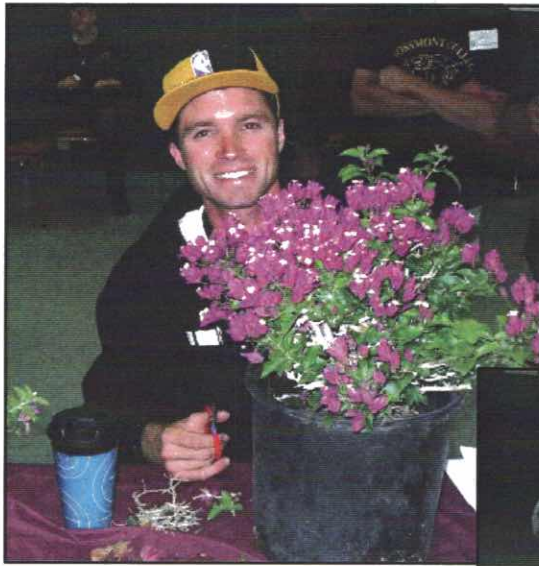

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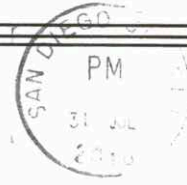

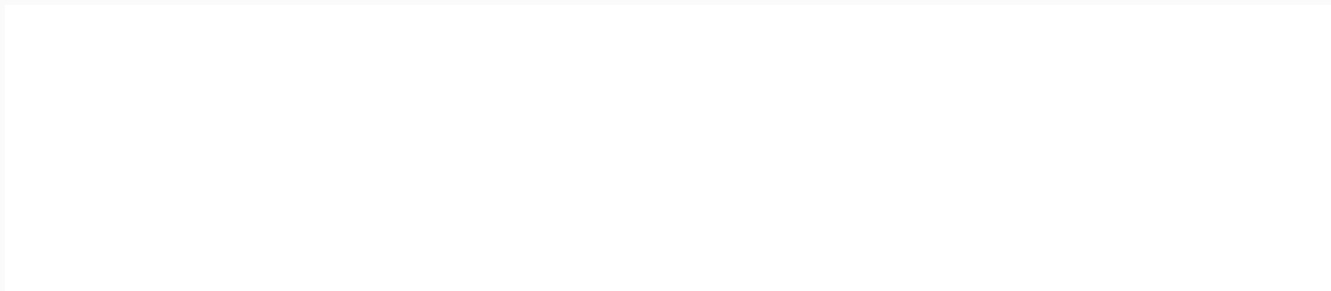
