














Bonsai Program - January

Fred Miyahara, Lucas Field, and Dennis Wagner, presented an overview black pine maintenance concepts.







Fred Miyahara presented a series of activities evolving around Japanese Black Pines for the club membership as part of the February club meeting. Fred provided a slide presentation on black pines which provided details on repotting, pine basics, and other care and maintenance topics. Lucas Field and Dennis Wagner were in the background, repotting two Japanese black pines while Fred presented. After Fred's presentation, Lucas and Dennis moved up to the main stage to complete their repotting activities. Fred mentioned that roots would swirl at the bottom due to water accumulation. By using

to provide drainage, this would prevent root swirl at the bottom of the pot. Fred also made note of how much work can be done safely without impacting a tree's health, and also mentioned assessing a tree's health status before working on it. It was also an interesting note that true Japanese pines may not have any original branches, and may have all of its branches grafted on. Many thanks to Fred, Lucas, and Dennis for presenting and demonstrating to the membership, fundamentals and maintenance for the Japanese black pine.

January 9th, 2011

- Call to Order: The meeting of members of San Diego Bonsai Club was called to order at 10:30 a.m. by Abe Far, President. A quorum was present.
- 2. Approval of Minutes: The minutes for the December 11, 2010 meeting were approved.
- 3. Reports
- ➤ Abe Far, President, 1) Stressed the need for all members to get involved, no matter the level. 2) Jim Rendina will show a Japanese Maple at Winter Silhouettes. 3) Jim Rendina will also be SDBC Representative to the San Diego County Fair.
- Maria Barbosa, Treasurer: 1) Over the past week, the Club received \$3,200 in donations to the Pavilion Project.
- 2) Bank balances: Club:\$6,811.50, 7-month CD:\$5,059.92, and Pavilion:\$32,100. 3) 2010 tax receipts are available.
- ➤ Cary Sullivan-Valentine, Vice President Membership: 1) Introduced 7 new members; 2) Announced that, following action at the last Board meeting, any member over the age of 80 will no longer pay annual dues and will become honorary members.
- > Steve Valentine, Vice President Education: 1) Thanked Dave Rochester for providing the trees and leading the 3-session beginner class, and also thanked the several others who give hands-on advice. 2) Fred Miyahara conducted the well-attended intermediate class, working on black pines. 3) In February, the intermediate class will focus on repotting of any tree. A small fee will be charged to cover the cost of supplies.
- Fred Miyahara, Japanese Friendship Garden: 1) A youth class, offered to San Diego 5th graders, is held at the Garden between 10:30-12 Noon every 4th Friday, except in November and December when the class is held on the 3rd Friday to accommodate school vacation schedule. Club members assist as these youth as they work on small junipers. 2) \$2.5 million has been spent upgrading and improving the garden, including fences, a large and small waterfall, and cherry trees. The first cherry blossom festival, to become an annual celebration, is scheduled for April 19, 2011. 3) On February 5 and 19, and March 5, the Garden will offer a beginner bonsai class. This project is being coordinated with the Club.
- ➤ 'Iyn Stevenson, SDBC Pavilion, Safari Park Liaison): 1) Thanked the many volunteers who have given their time especially the 19 who helped install fencing on January 8. 2) Reminded everyone the initial meeting to discuss the May 1 opening would be held following the day's demonstration..
- ➤ Barbara French-Lee, Special Projects: 1) January 15, 2011 Bus Trip to Winter Silhouettes @ Los Angeles Arboretum, including stops at two nurseries. The bus will leave Balboa Park at 11:00 and the Carlsbad stop at 11:30 a.m., returning by 11 p.m. 2) February 26, 2011 Bus Trip to Bonsai-a-thon @ Huntington Gardens with a stop at Jim Barrett's.

SDBC Pavilion Opening at Safari Park

It was an exciting and eventful day 24 years ago, on May 9, 1987, when John Yoshio Naka came to San Diego's Wild Animal Park and cut the ribbon, opening the largest permanent display facility for bonsai in the Western USA.

Now, 24 years later, the San Diego Bonsai Club is pleased to announce the opening of its expanded Bonsai Pavilion. The location is just yards above the former Pavilion but encompasses about four times the original 3000 square foot pad. The new Pavilion has a waterfall, a serpentine stream, three low bridges, and two ponds setting a tranquil background for the expanding Bonsai collection.

The original landscape was done by Mas Takanashi, SDBC's founding President, and he encouraged this new expansion.

Unfortunately, Mas passed on in 2008 but he will be honored by SDBC with the official MAS TAKANASHI GATE at the front of the Pavilion. The SDBC logo has been incorporated into the gate's design by Architect and SDBC Bonsai Member from Tijuana, Guillermo Castano.

Trees from the original pavilion that were donated by John Naka (his "Wild Dragon"), Kaz Yoneda, Melba Tucker, Stan Childs, Harry Hirao, Mas Takanashi, Ko Tsushima, Jerrold Parrish, Bruce & Yaeko Hisayasu, Frank Dixon, Herb Markowitz, and many other members and friends from California will live on in this new location. Cap Puliafico, the SDBC President in 1980, an employee of the Wild Animal Park, was the impetus for the first project and Stan Childs was the SDBC President in 1987 for the Opening.

The Wild Animal Park's name has recently been changed to the San Diego Zoo Safari Park. SDBC is grateful to this organization for not only providing the real estate for this wonderful exhibit but also providing the security and the water supply for the bonsai. It has been a most congenial relationship between the Park and the SDBC for these many years and both groups look forward to sharing the new Bonsai Pavilion for the Park visitors.

John Jackson, a member of the original construction team is serving as the construction manager for this new site and one of his challenges is moving the original TORI to the new site. Dennis Wagner has directed and installed all the new electrical access sites. Steve Valentine, the Bonsai Pavilion's curator has been most active in procuring materials for the fence construction also. A great cadre of SDBC volunteers has provided the in-kind work that saved the project from costing much more than normally would be needed. These same volunteers will also be the docents and caretakers for the Bonsai collection in the future.

San Diego Bonsai Club cordially invites all our bonsai friends in SDBC to join us on May 1, 2011 for the Opening of the Pavilion. In addition, Cary Valentine, the chair for the Opening Celebration, will be sending invitations to all the GSBF Clubs with more details and directions. She is requesting replies for planning purposes. More announcements will be made at upcoming SDBC meetings, as well as updates in the newsletter. After the Opening in May, the Pavilion's hours will be the same as those of the Safari Park — which is open 365 days of the year. We look forward to sharing our living treasures with all our bonsai friends.

San Diego Bonsai-Bonsai Ideas

#110 _cebuary, 2011

This is a good time to prepare your fertilizer supplies. Chemical and organic liquid fertilizers require no advance planning. They can be freshly mixed when you are ready to apply. If you are a user of the recommended dry mixes such as cottonseed meal, with 20% bone meal, now is the time to make your mix. Keep the finished product in a dry place. If it gets wet it will begin to ferment and will drive you out of your yard!

Remember, acid fertilizers are best for azaleas and camellias as well as conifers and junipers. The idea, when feeding in early spring is <u>slow release</u>. Don't rush your trees into a spurt of new growth too soon.

If deciduous trees start to sprout bring them gradually into sunlight. If they are kept in a fully shaded area the new growth will tend to be long, leggy and weak. Be careful to protect this new growth from any surprise cold spell that will cause die-back. When warm weather comes, so does the ever-present insect population. Be prepared to spray early with a good commercial insecticide or miticide. Follow manufacturer's directions for your mixtures.

This is a good time to spray deciduous trees with a dormant spray before any signs of new growth appears. February is a good month for this application. Use ORTHO GARDEN & DISEASE CONTROL as an excellent substitute for Lime Sulfur or Daconil, as a fungicide.

During this <u>idle time</u> you can occupy yourself with a program of pot cleanup. All those pots that have been sitting around and waiting for the repotting activities to begin have probably accumulated layers of soil and lime deposits. Scrub them with a strong soapy solution and some bleach. Apply vinegar or a lime-off cleaner to the calcium spots or just some elbow grease and cleanser. Rinse them well. Allow them to dry in the full sun. The Japanese erasers can be helpful.

Make a list of the trees that will require repotting this spring. Place a marker in the pots that require attention this year for identification. Begin with deciduous or flowering/fruiting trees, still in a dormant stage or just beginning to emerge. Go easy on any pruning that may be required, particularly on these early transplants. Wait until the sap begins to flow before you do any serious pruning or pinching of the new growing tips until they harden.

Another important activity at this time involves your tools. Now is the time to sort them out. Sharpen all cutting edges, remove accumulations of rust and sap stains. Oil all surfaces for protection. Try W-D 40.

Don't overlook the last step in your spring dress-up program. Look at all of the finished trees. Are the pots clean? Is the surface of each planting clear of winter trash and properly surfaced with fresh soil? Is there the beginning of moss color? Are the edges of the pots all trimmed to allow a channel along the rims for drainage?

Ready to go for the new season.

Opening Day Celebration


If you have not heard or are new to our club, we are having our **Bonsai Pavilion Opening Day Celebration** at the San Diego Zoo Safari Park on May 1st.

SDBC member, Kenneth Bross, is now on the Honor Board with his recent \$100 donation.


We applaud these newest donors and appreciate their generosity. We invite these donors to enjoy the results of their contributions at the May 1, 2011 Opening of the

Faulty Branches

In January's Bonsai Ideas, by Marty Mann, there was a reference in the fourth paragraph indicating, "this is the time to study your bonsai designs". He also mentions a variety of possible faults and problem areas.

Pictured to the right is an image from John Naka's "Bonsai Techniques I" (1), and it illustrates a variety of faults that can occur in our bonsai or pre-bonsai and we should endeavor to address. Mr. Naka starts the page out by stating, "If the following faults cannot be addressed by wiring, they should be removed completely."

Mr. Naka wrote Bonsai Techniques I and II. These are excellent references and should be part of your personal library. We do have copies of these books in our club library as well as being available for purchase. The books are available at the end the tools table, near the intermediate area.

Throughout the year, I plan to make references where applicable to Mr. Naka's text. He has documented his collective knowledge in these books and as students, we should all endeavor to be familiar with these basic fundamentals.
