We had a very warm week or two and then a little bit of rain and then back to more normal temperatures. Another strange weather month! This has really confused a lot of my trees in to thinking it is spring. They are so confused right now!

<u>Beginning Class: - Ulmus parvifolia – Chinese Elm – Gary Jones</u> January 9, February 20, March 13. In the third and final session of the Beginners Class you will finalize your styling and learn how to repot your trees in to bonsai soil and a bonsai pot. Based on the trees at my house, yours should be pretty much in leaf. They will look like a bonsai now!

Intermediate Workshops:

March – Accent Plants and Kusamono – Cathy Edgar – Morning SOLD OUT! Cathy Edgar will lead the class in the creation of accent plants and kusamono. Cathy has many years' experience creating these small and delicate designs. She provides many examples for sale at our shows, and they are always a hit, selling out quickly. Cathy has been propagating plants and has pots just for this class. Class members will make a total of 3 different compositions. It will truly be a treat!!

This month Neil has given two presentations for the University of California Master Gardeners. He has filmed a demonstration of creating a bonsai from raw material for the Master Gardener's seminar in March.

Feature Article: Bugs by Charlie Mosse, edited by Sylvia Mosse

Bug Season Already?

In the good old days, we had freezing nights every year. The difference from year to year was how long it was below freezing and just how low the temperatures were. Freezing nights of decent duration helped to control some insect populations. We do not see that anymore. Our current freeze situation is just a bit of frost in some select areas. Temperatures at or around freezing for an hour or two is not a freeze. It may do a tiny bit of damage to tender plants, but it does little to kill off eggs etc.

What we see today is cool temperatures at night, not cold or freezing. Now let's add in daytime temperatures that are overall milder with more heat waves/spikes. The duration of the mild daytime temperatures is longer, and the nighttime chill is of shorter duration. This scenario is a boon for insects. More generations per season can and do occur during the growing season and, if the mild weather continues into winter, we can see insects in December through February when in the past we would not see them.

Since we do not monitor insects with traps and calculate degree days, our job is to keep an eye out for insects. Since weather is milder these days, we need to watch out for insects pretty much 12 months a year. We do know or can easily find out which insects live on which plants, weather conditions that trigger us to look for certain insects and past trouble one has had

A couple of good examples are spider mites on Shimpaku Junipers when the weather gets warm and dry for a long enough period, or white fly on Ficus in the warmer months. Due to milder winters, we can get outbreaks in the middle of our "winter" because we get these warm periods from the Santa Ana's like we saw this year. Case in point is that there is a 1-gallon Ficus microcarpa 'Tiger Bark' in the growing area at the Japanese Friendship Garden. Three different insects were observed on it at the end of January...mealy bugs, white fly egg masses and black scale. Fortunately, the insect populations were small, but all were active. The white fly egg masses were not thick but were on every leaf! Fortunately, the eggs had not hatched yet but with the warm weather that started on February 6th and lasted for 2+ weeks, there would have been a significant hatching of eggs. The insects were controlled with an insecticidal soap and in the case of the hard scale, physically removed. So, we do need to keep a watchful eye due in periods of milder and hotter weather, and seriously consider a winter dormant spray even for evergreens.

Tidbit....This brings up the principle of "degree days". Using good weather data and knowing a particular insect's degree day threshold, one can figure about when to expect eggs to hatch and when to watch out for the insect. Professional container and field growers use this tool to determine when to lookout for insects and weeds. They also use insect traps, for a particular insect, to give them an idea of the insect population and how fast it is growing. This assists in knowing when to spray or deploy natural predators and biological control, if any of these are needed at all. We do not use degree days so we rely on inspecting our plants by eyesight, using a magnifier, and using common sense, which is that when the weather warms for a long enough period, say 2-3 weeks, then insects may be hatching or emerging. The link below is from the University of California Ag and Natural Resources site. Again, we do not bother with this, but it is informative and is a tool used by professional growers. Knowing an insect's life cycle and triggers will help one reduce the time, expense, and exposure to chemicals. Since we do not deal with too many different insects and diseases, we learn over time how to keep them under control.

Tidbit....many insects are visible to the eye or under low magnification, some are not so apparent until the infestation is causing harm in some way. Spider mites are a chronic problem, particularly on junipers. Mites are very difficult to see, hold a piece of paper or your hand under a branch and firmly tap it several times. This will knock mites out of the branch where they are more visible. If the tiny dot moves, it is most likely a spider mite. Then you start your control of mites by washing the mites off with a strong fan spray of water. Wait for the plant to dry and then start your control regimen with your preferred mite spray, per the label instructions. If the infestation is minor, you may be able to get away with just spraying off the foliage with water several times per week. Hose off in the morning so the tree can dry off before evening to help prevent the spread of disease like juniper tip blight. Keeping the juniper foliage open, helps to dry the foliage, helps with washing, and helps with the application of pesticides and foliar feeding. Program Notes from our February meeting: By Keith Carter

The Feb. 20 SDBC meeting provided members with a rare opportunity to have their own trees evaluated by three of the club's most respected bonsai experts.

Long-time members Fred Miyahara, John Jackson and Mark Edgar agreed to share their decades of knowledge and experience with the packed audience by critiquing a variety of trees brought in by members. The idea was to give expert feedback not only on the specific trees evaluated but to provide other bonsai enthusiasts specific ideas and suggestions that they might be able to use when deciding how to improve their own trees. The trio examined 16 different trees that included bonsai staples such as boxwoods, pines, elms, junipers, olives, and oaks, along with less common specimens such as a Yaupon holly, a potato tree and even a schefflera. The quality of trees evaluated ranged from a straight-from-the-nursery pot boxwood to a dramatic elm worthy of display in a "winter silhouettes" exhibition. Their advice ranged from suggestions for simple improvements such as using a different pot for a cork oak to the recommendation of urgent treatment for a fungus that was damaging a black pine. At times offering specific steps that could be taken for each tree and other times suggesting general ideas for overall improvements, the three voiced ideas that would benefit every bonsai owner. At times, they even disagreed with one another about what could be done for each tree. All three made several comments about each tree. Here are a few key takeaways from their evaluations:

Fred Miyahara: — On a black pine, he advised larger gauge wire was needed because the smaller 2.0- and 2.5-mm wire used was simply not strong enough to train the branches. In response to a question, he said that trimming pines should be done in October or November about 12 weeks after candling. — For a nursery stock boxwood with two main branches emerging from the soil, Fred suggested splitting it into two separate trees and potting them separately.

John Jackson—In examining a large windswept-style juniper, John pointed out that the trunk and main branch was going in one direction, while the foliage was growing in the opposite direction, a serious flaw in an otherwise attractive tree. "Bonsai needs to make sense," he said. — During his review of a small black pine, John cautioned patience to those growing pines, saying that they take 2-3 times as long as other trees to develop.

Mark Edgar—For a leggy potato tree resting atop a rock, he suggested that the tree would make a much stronger display statement if it was planted more upright and tipped forward. —Looking at a boxwood, Mark suggested that crossing branches needed to be cut off. He also suggested that the tree was too small for the pot and that it also needed to be planted in better soil.

Meeting Minutes:

Minutes of SDBC Board Feb. 8, 2022 ... reported by Keith Carter

The meeting was called to order by President Ignacio De La Torre at 6:33 p.m. via Zoom. Attending were Kyle Icke, Bill Graham, Uday Pandey, Markel Farley, Jaya Kaelberer, and Sue Carter. Not present was Carla Marasco. Keith Carter served as acting secretary.

OFFICER REPORTS

MEMBERSHIP (Uday) -As of today, the club has 247 current members. Since July 2021, we have added 98 new members. Uday added a note in the February Bonsai Wire reminding people to renew. They have until March to renew or be considered in arrears. -Jaya said that the club pays \$3 per member for insurance, so she needs to have a specific number. Last year, we paid insurance for 310 members. Uday said that would be a good number for 2022 as well. -Sue agreed to give access to Google Drive to Sonya Holmquist as librarian and Susan Baker as Sunshine Chairman to access contact information about members.

TREASURER (Jaya) -Julia Chow and Janice Hale performed a successful audit of the club's finances in January. They found several minor discrepancies that were corrected. For example, when Qualcomm gave money, it went into the SDBC account, but should have been to the Safari Park Pavilion account. Either Janice or Julia will announce the results of audit at the next meeting. -Jaya left the meeting at 7:10.

EDUCATION (Bill) -Fred Miyahara will conduct a workshop this month on grafting. Julian Tsai and Kathy Edgar are also scheduled for workshops on March 13 – Kathy in the morning and Julian in the afternoon. -In April, Kristina Far, along with Abe Far, will conduct her first workshop (boxwoods) as lead instructor. May's meeting will be at the Safari Park, so no workshop then, but Louie Montecillo will hold a June workshop on large junipers, with John Voss doing an olive class in July. -The next beginner class series will be April-June-July, with Glenn Jensen as instructor. While the current beginner class enrolled 31 persons, Bill said that is too many and will restrict the size of future classes. Most future workshops will be limited to six people to give participants time to get adequate one-on-one time with the instructor. -Bill said he will be ordering more books and other supplies for the beginner class because he is running low on some items.

PROGRAMS (Kyle)-The Feb. 20 program will be Fred Miyahara, Mark Edgar and John Jackson evaluating trees brought in by members and offering styling ideas. -In March, Josh Miller from the San Sui Kai Bonsai Club in Encino will conduct a program on grafting. He is proposing to set up 4-5 tables with different trees and anyone who wants to try their hand at grafting can volunteer to participate. Josh will give an overview and help people perform grafting. He will bring five trees, provide instruction to participants, and then auction off the trees. -Sue suggested that the club presell the spots for grafting participants. Ignacio suggested limiting participation to one person per tree to maintain the presentation aspect rather seem more like a workshop. Kyle will negotiate the cost of travel and materials.-For future presentations, Kyle has spoken to Roy Nagatoshi of Fuji Bonsai Nursery, and is working to figure out a date. Bill suggested we will need to identify a high-quality tree for him to be able to style; Kyle will ask if we can buy a tree from Roy and then auction it off. -Other possible presenters Kyle has spoken with include Cheryl Manning, who may be able to come in the fall; Bob Pressler, who would like to revisit the Brazilian rainforest tree he worked on last year; and Julian Tsai, who also has agreed to do another demonstration at a date to be determined. -Kyle said he learned that Jim Barrett is in hospice care. His wife Helen told Kyle they have a lot of pots for sale, if anyone wants to go up to Arcadia. Bill said he will contact Helen to see what pots are left. If he can get them for a good price, he will buy them for the club, and we can sell them at the next show.

SPECIAL PROJECTS (Markel) -The Bonsai-a-thon at Huntington Gardens has been postponed from Feb. 26-27 and now will be held on a new tentative date of April 2-3. Markel said it would not be possible for him to coordinate a bus trip for April 2 and to also organize the club's April show. He asked the board for guidance on whether to cancel the planned bus trip and allow members to attend on their own. -Ignacio said the state is relaxing COVID guidelines Feb. 15, but L.A. County is not changing. He still is uncertain whether the April 2 date is final, based on a disclaimer included on a flyer promoting the Bonsai-a-thon. Bill said that based on his contact with Bonsai-a-thon insiders such as Steve Valentine and Mel Ikeda, he believes it will happen on the new dates. -Kyle voiced support for allowing members to make the trip on their own and suggested the club refrain from bus trips until COVID is less of a threat. -After discussion, Sue made a motion to postpone all bus trips for now. Markel seconded the motion. The motion passed by 6-0 vote.

PRESIDENT (Ignacio) -In discussing the dinner that traditionally has been held as part of the Spring Show, Ignacio asked whether there has been a separate committee that works on dinner or is it considered part of the show itself. Sue said Abe Far had handled the dinner in the past. She said that refreshments coordinator Matt Jillson said that if Abe had the necessary equipment and still wants to handle the dinner, it's all right with him. Traditionally Abe has handled arranging for the main courses to be catered, with members bringing side dishes and desserts. Ignacio said he will speak to Matt about the dinner. -Ignacio reported that members of the Baikoen bonsai club have been invited and are likely to bring as many as 20 people from their club and others in the Los Angeles area. Ignacio said he will contact other clubs to see whether they have people coming for the dinner. -Markel will start taking signups from those who are volunteering to work the show at the February meeting.
