Education: Bill Graham, VP for Education

It continues to be hot! Keep an eye on your watering and ensure that your trees do not dry out. In my neck of the woods daily temperatures continue to be in the mid 90s and higher. When it gets like this, you may have to water twice a day. Check your soil regularly to see whether is needs watering or not. Lately, there has also been a lot of wind lately, which will dry your trees out just as bad as the excess heat.

Unfortunately I was not able to be at the July meeting. John Voss led a good workshop class with some really nice large olives. I can't wait to see pictures of the trees to see what was created.

Beginning Class: Myrtus communis - Common Myrtle - Brenda Crann

Mike has been involved in bonsai for the past 28 years after beginning his journey at the age of 14. As a teen-ager, he joined the former Fuji Bonsai Club in Berkeley, where he studied under Jimmy Inadomi and Dennis Makishima.

Over the years, Mike has written articles on an array of topics for magazines such as Golden Statements and Bonsai He has also conducted Focus. workshops and demonstrations for the State Federation Golden Bonsai Convention and bonsai clubs in the Bay Area, Southern California and Seattle area.

In 2016, a Sierra Juniper he had collected five years earlier was awarded the best of show and best native species in the Golden State Bonsai Federation judged competition. Mike became a member of Mirai Live, an online teaching platform developed by Ryan Neil, in 2018, which enabled him

Bonsai Heresy by Michael Hagedorn, 2020

Michael Hagedorn is a well-known bonsai artist and teacher from the Pacific Northwest. In his book subtitled "56 Myths Exposed Using Science and Tradition," Hagedorn reveals that many accepted bonsai truths may be no more than old wives' hearsay. His blogs can be found at crataegus.com.

Principles of Bonsai Design, New 2nd Edition, by David De Groot, 2022

Another well-respected bonsai master from the Pacific Northwest, David De Groot was the first curator of the Pacific Bonsai Museum located outside of Seattle in Federal Way, Wash. In fact, one of the museum's current exhibitions is "De Groot: A Retrospective," featuring bonsai from his personal collection. Among the book's highlights are his discussions of how technique and art come together in bonsai. This book is highly recommended by Charlie Mosse.

Visions Of My Soul, by Robert Stevens, 2005.

A Jakarta, Indonesia, resident, Robert Stevens is first an artist, then a bonsai artist. For him, the fundamentals of bonsai art and aesthetics are: line, form, texture, color, dimension, composition, perspective, anatomical balance, optical balance, subjective & objective, and value of interest. July meeting wrap up: by Ignacio De La Torre and Carla Marasco

Bob Pressler, our speaker at the July SDBC meeting, is always an entertaining presenter, and he did not disappoint. As he styled a Brazilian rain tree – a tree that had grown unchecked since he worked on it last year at a club presentation – Bob shared many stories and information-packed nuggets with our members.

He started by removing overgrown branches, trimming that is done for basic overall shape and proportions before repotting. He left sacrifice branches at the top and at the base of the tree to encourage those areas to thicken. Sacrifice branches at the top of a tree are left to thicken the trunk; others can be left to heal cuts or thicken other areas of the tree. He removed most of the leaves on the sacrifice branches, leaving only those on the very tip. The inner growth can be cleaned to allow air and light to the inner part of the tree, which will encourage the branch to grow.

Bob then spent a good amount of time combing out the roots of the tree in preparation for repotting, which he said is probably the most important thing to do to a bonsai. When done at the right time for the specific type of tree being worked on, a tree won't know that it was repotted. If repotting is done correctly and at the right time, it will help with the success of the tree. If done at the wrong time, repotting will slow the progress of a tree and possibly even kill it. Bob removed as much of the old soil that he could (this species can withstand such work). Deciduous and tropical trees can have most of their old soil removed; pines and junipers cannot.

A number of roots were removed, including those that cross one another. Bob said that sometimes we have to leave roots that we don't want because other roots are not present, but Brazilian rain trees can withstand heavy root work. He advised removing all large crossing roots if possible. Big, heavy roots are not needed; it's the fine feeder roots that are important. Knowing the tree you are working with is key. Some can have roots reduced aggressively while some need a slower

reduction process. Defoliation or partial defoliation may help to a tree's demand for nutrients after a severe root reduction. It also allows more light and air into to the inside part of the tree to keep it healthy.

The tree was then repotted into a large wooden box with ample room for root growth and legs to allow for air circulation. Wooden boxes are great for growing bonsai because they absorb and release moisture and can provide more space for trunk thickening.

When removing a tree from its plastic pot, Bob advised holding the tree and knocking the pot away rather than yanking the tree out of the pot. He planted the tree at a slight angle to highlight the nuanced twin-trunk design with two apexes. It is important to wire trees into the pot to prevent movement. That stabilization will protect new roots from damage as well as protecting the tree a bit more in case it falls down. Typically 2.0-2.5-gauge wire is usually strong enough to hold most trees in a pot. When using a chopstick for compacting air pockets in soil, Bob recommended using your finger to push soil down into the hole; don't just poke at the soil. And he suggested leaving the tree in the box for 2-3 years in order to thicken the trunk before moving it into a bonsai pot.

Bob has always been very generous to the SDBC and that continued with his most recent visit when he insisted on donating the demonstration tree to our club. After a furious bidding war, Carl Gilbert and his wife had the winning bid to be able to take the tree home. The Gilberts plan to move back to New Orleans, a place where the tree should do very well.

Thank you, Bob for visiting our club and for your generosity. We are already looking forward to your return next year.


